


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Outline of the Spiritual Exercises

Spiritual Exercises include every way of examining one's conscience, of meditating, of contemplating, of praying vocally and mentally, and of performing other spiritual actions. For as strolling, walking and running are bodily exercises, so every way of preparing and disposing the soul to rid itself of all the disordered tendencies, and, after it is rid, to seek and find the Divine Will as to the management of one's life for the salvation of the soul, is called a Spiritual Exercise.

St. Ignatius of Loyola (4 Weeks)

1st week

Principle and Foundation:

Man is created to praise, reverence, and serve God our Lord, and by this means to save his soul.

And the other things on the face of the earth are created for man and that they may help him in prosecuting the end for which he is created.

From this it follows that man is to use them as much as they help him on to his end, and ought to rid himself of them so far as they hinder him as to it.

For this it is necessary to make ourselves indifferent to all created things in all that is allowed to the choice of our free will and is not prohibited to it; so that, on our part, we want not health rather than sickness, riches rather than poverty, honor rather than dishonor, long rather than short life, and so in all the rest; desiring and choosing only what is most conducive for us to the end for which we are created.

A Modern Presentation (5 Phases)

1st phase

God's Plan:

This stage seeks to guide us to the convincing knowledge of the fundamental truth's of life, and to the decision of living in conformity with them; God is my Creator and Father and I am a creature and son, called to answer God's call and to carry out his plan over me, using the creatures that help me and leaving aside those that hinder me.

Objectives:

- 1) Renew my knowledge of the fundamental truths of life.
- 2) Renewed desire to live according to them.

2nd phase

My answer:

Here we look at our personal failures in responding to God's Plan. God's Mercy is the final word. We look at our sinfulness so that we may experience the mercy of God.

Objectives:

- 1) Acknowledgement our failures.
- 2) Experience of God's Mercy.
- 3) Gratitude.

2nd week

The Kingdom of Christ:

The aim is to arrive to an interior knowledge and love of the person of Jesus Christ, so that the retreatant may adapt his life to the model Christ and identify himself with Him as the concrete norm of Christian perfection. This assimilation to Christ is brought about by a series of meditations on His private and public life.

3rd phase

Encountering Our Redeemer, the Incarnation and Life of Christ:

The mysteries of the life of Christ meditated upon and contemplated. As it is said of the Blessed Mother, "As for Mary, she treasured all these things and pondered them in her heart". (Lk 2: 19) Here we would like to do the same.

Objectives:

- 1) Increase one's knowledge of Christ and His doctrine.
- 2) Grow in my love of Christ.
- 3) Desire to imitate Christ, to be an alter Christus.

3rd week

Passion and Death of Jesus Christ:

This week is concerned with the Passion of Our Lord and is intended to confirm the retreatant in the options he has taken to follow Christ more closely by increasing his grateful love for Christ and his sorrow for his sins through the study of Christ's suffering.

4th phase

Encountering Our Redeemer, Passion and Death:

The contemplation of the Passion of Our Lord. St. Paul's exhortation may guide the retreatant: "Make your own the mind of Christ Jesus." (Phil 2:5) "I have been crucified with Christ and yet I am alive; yet it is no longer I, but Christ living in me." (Gal 2:19-20)

Objective:

To embrace the cross of my life as a priest with love as Christ embraced the Cross.

4th week

Resurrection of Jesus Christ:

The fourth week develops meditations on the Risen Life of Christ and is intended to engender unselfish love, joy in Christ's glory, and an unchanging trust in Christ the Consoler.

(The Spiritual Exercises of St. Ignatius)

5th phase

Encountering Our Redeemer, Life in the Risen Christ:

The identification with Christ suffering experienced in stage four is followed by the joyful experience of the Risen Christ.

Objective:

Experience of true Christian joy united to the desire to love, imitate and serve Christ as a priest forever.

Introduction to Spiritual Exercises

Aim: Spiritual Exercises have three main goals:

- To know ourselves
- To know the person of Jesus Christ
- □ To imitate the person of Jesus Christ

Every element of the retreat is design to accomplish these aims in a harmonious way: there is nothing superfluous. During meals, there will be a reading from a spiritual Book, which can be the most lifechanging moment of the entire retreat. Take advantage of the free times to take some fresh air and go over the inspirations of the Holy Spirit in your soul.

The main qualities required for a good retreat are humility, sincerity and generosity. Humility, to be well disposed to approach God; sincerity, to be open to what God is asking of you; and generosity, to respond as Mary did: "Let it be done to me according to your word."

The initial questionnaire may be a helpful way to begin the retreat with the correct dispositions.

Silence

Silence is key to a successful retreat since God speaks to us in the silence of our hearts. We should be silent both externally and internally. External silence is not speaking to anyone else except the spiritual director or retreat master. More important, internal silence is leaving behind worries and concerns (work, home, kids, etc...) to focus on the retreat and only the retreat. A true spirit of silence also requires mental discipline – making the effort to concentrate on the material of the retreat and not just "good and spiritual things" that are not the focus of the retreat.

Free Time and Breaks

This is not just time to fill. You should go over your meditations, pray the rosary, prepare your confession or spiritual direction, work your program of life, make visits to the Blessed Sacrament, or take a walk to get some fresh air and reflect.

Rosary

We should remain close to our Blessed Mother throughout the retreat, and take some time to pray the rosary each day. Unless otherwise indicated, you should pray the rosary individually and in silence during one of the free times.

Meals

Grace is said before all meals, which are normally buffet – style. To help promote recollection and to reinforce retreat themes, there are readings during the meals. Eat well to have the strength to pray well and take the time to finish your meal, if you have not done so, before the thanksgiving prayer at the end, after, which you are free to go.

Meditation

The meditation is a guided reflection on a particular truth about God, Christ, the Church, or us. It begins with a series of reflections by the retreat master, who then invites the retreatants to continue praying in silence on those points that struck them most. They can do this wherever is most conductive to prayer: the chapel, conference room or their own room, remembering that this is the most important part of the meditation and should be given its full time. The whole meditation is normally an hour long. The last few moments should be dedicated to making a personal resolution based on the reflection. It is good to write down any lights from the Holy Spirit.

Prayer is essentially a dialogue with God. It is a personal, heart to heart conversation that enlightens the soul, strengthens the will, and enables us to accept — and carry out — God's will for our lives. Prayer out to renew us from within. When it is authentic, prayer influences the way we think, how we feel, and the decisions we make in our daily lives.

Preparation for Prayer

Preparing your soul for mental prayer is not something we can accomplish by our own efforts. We need God's help in order to pray. We must always begin our prayer by invoking the assistance of the Holy Spirit – the "sweet guest of the soul" who dwells within us. In fact, without the Holy Spirit, nothing lasting or solid can be attained in the work of our growth in holiness.

Next, it is good to consider what we are about to do and with whom we are going to speak to. In prayer we meet the One who made us and who knows us perfectly; the One who neither deceives nor can be deceived; the Father who loves us infinitely more than we love ourselves.

A good next step is to renew our faith in God, express our love for him, rekindle our confidence in his promises, thank him for all his gifts, and recognize what we really are before him, that is, fragile creatures who need redemption.

Now we are ready to ask God for the particular gift we hope to receive as a "fruit" or result of our prayer. Sometimes this fruit is something particular and concrete, such as the strength to overcome a particular weakness or the patience to practice a certain virtue. Other times, it can seek something deeper; for example, that inner change of heart necessary to follow Christ more closely.

It is important to remember that authentic prayer engages everything we are: our intelligence and will, our feelings and affections, our interests and desires. The Lord wishes to transform our entire being with his grace. Thus prayer is much more than "thinking" about God and spiritual things.

Forms of Mental Prayer

Prayer normally takes two essential forms.

- 1) The first form or type is more reflective and consists in taking an idea or Gospel principle and turning it over on our minds. We try to penetrate to the heart of the truth contained in this idea. We strive to see how it applies to our own lives. We ask, "What is God saying to me through these words or this episode from the Gospel?" "Is my way of thinking and acting like that of Christ, or on the contrary, more like that of his enemies?" And finally, our calm reflection should bring us to make a conscious choice for God. In other words, it ought to serve as a tool through which we decide to live in accordance with the truth we have discovered, day after day and year after year.
- 2) The second type of prayer is more contemplative. Here we choose an event in the life of Christ, Mary or another character from the Gospel and observe the scene as if we were actually present. By seeing the people, listening to their words and considering their actions, we draw lessons from what we experience. Here again the truly important thing is to decide to imitate in our own lives what we have contemplated during prayer.

The choice of either of these types of prayer depends chiefly on the Holy Spirit who is at work within us. It will depend on our personal spiritual needs at any given moment as well as on the recommendations of our spiritual director.

Listening in Prayer

In prayer, it is not enough to reflect or contemplate. If prayer is a dialogue with God, then over time we need to learn to listen to God. We need to speak with him and allow him to mold us into the image of His Son. To accomplish this, we must approach him full of faith and love.

Habit of Prayer

The fruitfulness of prayer depends primarily on God's action, but it also requires our cooperation. Therefore, we do well to make an honest effort in prayer and in acquiring the habit of daily prayer. This requires learning to set aside and overcome the difficulties we face in prayer: distractions, tiredness, and negative feelings – which we suffer especially in times of temptation and dryness. It is greatly helped by having a set time for prayer each day.

Conferences

Conferences or talks are more practical in nature than meditations. Possible themes include tips on prayer or guidance on preparing your program of life. Unlike the meditation, there is no time dedicated to personal reflection at the end. We begin all meditations and conferences with the following opening prayer:

Opening Prayer for Meditations/Conferences

V: Come, Holy Spirit,

R: Fill the hearts of your faithful and kindle in them the fire of Your love.

V: Send forth your Spirit and they shall be created,

R: And You shall renew the face of the earth.

V: Let us pray: O God, by the light of the Holy Spirit, You have taught the hearts of your faithful. In that same Spirit, help us to know what is truly right and always rejoice in his consolation. We ask this through Christ our Lord.

R: Amen.

Hail Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with thee; blessed art thou among women, and blessed is the fruit of thy womb, Jesus.

Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners, now and at the hour of our death, Amen.

Grant me the fortitude I need to accomplish it as perfectly as you ask of me. Lastly, Spirit of love, grant me the grace of responding faithfully to your holy inspirations.

Prayer to the Blessed Virgin Mary

Mother, I come before you on this new day to consecrate to you all my thoughts, words, and actions, and to ask your blessing for me, my loved ones, and all whom I encounter along my way. Grant me the heart of an apostle of the Kingdom, and enable me to imitate the life of prayer, obedience, humility, fidelity, sacrifice and simplicity that you shared with your Son, our brother and Lord. Mother, tell Jesus how much I want to serve him in Regnum Christi, and make his Kingdom present among all people.

Examen to prepare the day

We take a few minutes of reflection in God's presence to review our day's agenda, offer him our activities, and renew our intention to live in Christ all day long.

Night Prayers

My Lord and my God, I thank You for the countless gifts You have given me, especially for creating and redeeming me, for calling me to the Catholic faith, for choosing me to be an apostle among my brothers and sisters, and for freeing me from so many dangers of soul and body. Enlighten my mind so I can recognize my faults, and grant me the grace to be truly sorry and sincerely mend my ways.

Take a few minutes for a conscience examination. The following questions are suggestions to help you evaluate your day and the months since your last retreat. It is recommended, however, that you draw up, with the help of your spiritual director, questions that correspond better and more directly to your current spiritual and apostolic situation. You may also use your commitment card as a guide to examine your conscience).

- 1. Does the awareness that I am a child of God, and bear the seal of this reality on my soul, permeate my day? Do I behave like his good, faithful son or daughter? Is there anything in particular that satisfies or displeases God, my Father? Have I tried to do God's will in my various activities today? Have I performed them with this intention?
- 2. Have I tried hard, sincerely, and fervently, to use my means for spiritual growth well?
- 3. Have I fulfilled the duties of my state in life (as a son or daughter, student, parent, spouse, etc.) honestly and responsibly, in a spirit of service? Have I sought God's glory and the good of others more than my own personal interests?
- 4. Have I lived out Christian charity in thoughts, words, attitudes and actions? In other words, have I done good to others by helping to make them happy, especially those closest to me being patient, not talking badly of them or holding grudges, forgiving, and helping out as much as I could whenever I had the opportunity?
- 5. How well have I carried out my mission as an apostle? Did I take the necessary steps and seize the opportunities to win souls for Christ? Do I have clear apostolic goals and have I striven to meet them? Was I generous in giving my time and resources to further Christ's interests?

- 6. What omissions was I guilty of today?
- 7. Have I taken care to form a sensitive conscience?
- 8. Do I know what my root defect is? (Lack of devotion, pride, self-love, vanity, laziness, faultfinding, envy, gluttony, lack of charity, frivolity and superficiality, sensuality, neglectfulness, irresponsibility in my work, individualism, indifference to the common good...) What have I done today to improve?
- 9. What was the most positive thing in my day?
- 10. What was the most negative thing in my day?

To conclude the evaluation take a few moments for a trusting, heartfelt conversation with the Lord: Thank him for what you have achieved, beg his forgiveness for the failings you detect, and ask his help to be better tomorrow. Then pray the prayers that follow. The point of praying the Creed is to profess the Catholic faith ever more consciously, and to ask God for the grace to bear witness to it openly and remain faithful to it in its entirety until the end of your life.

Spiritual Direction

Sign-up sheets for spiritual direction will be posted during the retreat. Take the time to prepare and have the points well ordered. It is helpful to write them down so as to make better use of your time and not to leave anything out.

Guide to Spiritual Direction

Spiritual direction is not a counseling session, but a dialogue in faith, within the Church. Keep in mind that there are three persons present – the spiritual director, the one directed and the Holy Spirit. The goal is to discover the light that the Holy Spirit sheds on both of you to reveal God's will in your concrete daily reality in order then to fulfill it.

Points to go over in Spiritual Direction:

Your program of life

- o What progress have you made since your last spiritual direction?
- o What difficulties have you encountered?
- o Has any part of the program become routine?
- o Are you avoiding or ignoring some of what you have proposed to do? Why?
- o Are there any adjustments that need to be made for it to be a better tool for your progress?
- o How have you done in the resolutions you made in the past spiritual direction?

Your prayer life

- o Have you been faithful to your prayer commitments?
- o Are you giving quality time to your prayer?
- o Are you making concrete resolutions and checking them periodically and keeping them faithfully?
- o What progress and difficulties have you noticed in mental prayer, sacramental life; the fruit of your spiritual commitments and your examination of conscience?
- o Is routine a problem? What have you tried to do to avoid it?

The general state of your soul:

o Is it dry, distracted, preoccupied, or serene, docile, confident and trusting in God's grace?

Apostolic Work:

- o Are you dedicating your time with real dedication, with a spirit of faith, hope and love? Or, is it an imposition of my "personal time"?
- o Are you working with the purity of intention for the glory of God and the advance of his Kingdom, or for personal satisfaction, human respect, and the desire for the esteem of others?

Formation of conscience:

- o Is your conscience lax and easy in giving you concessions?
- o Do you rationalize all your conduct away so you are always right?
- o Are you working to form a delicate, sensitive conscience that seeks to please God at every moment?
- o Do you tend to scrupulosity?

Guide to Confession

O GOD, HAVE MERCY ON ME, A SINNER." (Luke 18:13)

PART I: Preparation for General Confession

OBJECTIVE - PEACE OF SOUL

How long has it been since my last confession? What sins have I committed? Sin consists in any thought, word, or deed contrary to the wisdom and will of God. I must look over my life. The seven capital sins are pride, anger, lust, avarice, gluttony, envy and sloth.

CONFESSION OF MORTAL SINS

Sin is mortal when:

- The matter itself is serious
- Sufficient reflection
- Full consent of the will

CONFESSION OF VENIAL SINS

A venial sin is a minor offense against the law of God. Frequent confession of venial sins helps us to grow in holiness and humility. It increases our self-knowledge, helps us to correct our bad habits and resist neglect and tepidity. It purifies our conscience, strengthens our will and self-control and gives us the graces necessary to live a virtuous life.

PART II- Elements for a Worthy Confession

- 1. <u>Contrition</u> the most important act of the penitent; it is a "heartfelt sorrow and aversion for the sin committed along with the intention of sinning no more." (Rite of Penance, #5)
- 2. <u>Confession</u> penitent must enumerate all his mortal sins, in number and kind. The priest, "acting in the very person of Jesus Christ, pronounces his decision of forgiveness or retention of sins, in accord with the power of the keys."
- 3. <u>Act of Penance</u> "True conversion is completed by acts of penance for the sins committed, by amendment of conduct, and also by the reparation of injury." (Rite of Penance, #5)

4. **Absolution** - "God the Father of Mercies, through the Death and Resurrection of His Son, has reconciled the world to Himself and sent the Holy Spirit among us for the forgiveness of sins; through the ministry of the Church may God grant you pardon and peace and I absolve you from your sins in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit."

PART III – Examination of Conscience

- I. <u>Sins Against God and Catholic Faith</u> "Christ the Lord founded one Church and one Church only." (Lumen Gentium #8)
- Have I denied my Catholic Faith or parts of it?
- Have I despaired of God's mercy or denied it?
- ❖ Have I refused to believe in defined articles of the Catholic Faith?
- Have I fallen into the sin of indifferentism, that is, the notion that one religion is as good as another?
- ❖ Have I ever been ashamed of or denied my faith?
- 2. <u>Sins Against the Holy Name</u> "At the Name of Jesus, every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth, and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord." (Phil 2:10)
- Have I used the name of God thoughtlessly, in cursing or in blasphemy?
- * Have I used the name of the Lord in vain?
- ❖ Have I spoken irreverently about the Holy Mother of God or of the Saints?
- Have I attended films or listened to music that treats Our Lord or His Holy Mother in a blasphemous way?

3. Sins of Sacrilege -

- ❖ Have I had sufficient respect in Church for the Eucharistic Presence of Our Lord Jesus Christ? Have I consciously received the Sacraments in the state of mortal sin?
- ❖ Have I made a sacrilegious Confession by deliberately concealing any mortal sins from the priest?
- ❖ Have I, as a minister of the Eucharist, knowingly distributed the Sacred Species, while remaining in the state of mortal sin (e.g., the extraordinary minister who persists in using contraceptive measures

as means of limiting births contrary to the unmistakable teaching of the Church).

- 4. <u>Sins Against Others and Self</u> "As I have loved you, so you also should love one
- another." (John 13:34). All sin is an offense against God; all sin. Even a sin against self, is a detriment to the whole mankind.
- 5. <u>Sins of Disobedience</u> "Let every person be subordinate to the higher authorities, for there is no authority except from God and those that exist have been established by God." (Romans 13:1)
- ❖ Have I treated my parents with proper respect, especially when they may have become burdensome? Have I abandoned, ignored, or failed to be of help to parents in their old age.
- Have I complied with the just decrees of all lawful authority?

6. Sins Against Human Life -

- Have I caused the death or injury of another by neglect or by a positive act, such as drunk driving or selling illegal drugs?
- Have I unjustly wounded or struck another?
- Have I borne hatred or malice toward another?
- Have I attempted suicide or entertained thoughts of suicide?
- Have I participated in a direct abortion?
- Have I had a direct sterilization such as a vasectomy or tubal ligation?
- ❖ Have I practiced any form of contraception whatsoever?
- ❖ Have I engaged in other sins against human life such as artificial insemination or in vitro fertilization?
- Have I participated in any way in mercy-killing?

7. Sins of Racism -

Have I discriminated against others because of sex, race, color, social conditions, language, or religion?

8. Sins Against Chastity -

- Have I desired to do impure things?
- ❖ Have I viewed immodest pictures, films or TV programs?
- Have I committed impure actions alone (i.e., masturbation)?
- Have I committed impure actions with others by acts of adultery, fornication, or pre-marital sex?
- Have I committed homosexual acts?

- ❖ Have I taken genital pleasure in experiencing or seeing acts of violence on my own person or others?
- ❖ Have I been immodest in my dress?
- 9. <u>Sins of Scandal</u> Scandal can be defined as any word or deed that is the occasion for another persons spiritual ruin by sin. One is guilty of scandal by deliberately placing someone else in the occasion of sin: a parent who misses Mass; the parent who makes illicit use of drugs or alcohol; the promiscuous parent; the teacher or catechist who imparts sex information which is dissociated from Catholic moral principles.

10. Sins of Theft -

- ❖ Have I taken anything that was not my own?
- Have I cheated anyone out of something that is justly theirs?
- Have I damaged private or public property?
- ❖ Have I failed to give my employer an honest day's work?

11. Sins of Detraction and Calumny -

- Have I caused unjust injuries to the good name of another by revealing faults that are true but not already known publicly?
- Have I been guilty of rash judgment?
- 12. **Sins of Lying** Have I been guilty of a deliberate lie for any reason?

13. Sins of Gambling -

- Have I gambled with funds necessary to pay my lawful obligations?
- Have I gambled to excess in illegal or even legal games?

14. Sins Against the Commandments of the Church -

- Have I failed to assist at the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass on Sunday or on holy days of obligation?
- Have I observed the Church's laws concerning fast and abstinence during Lent and also before reception of Holy Communion?
- Have I neglected to make my Easter Duty?
- 15. <u>Sins Against the Seven Capital Sins</u> St. Thomas Aquinas lists seven capital sins or vices from which every other sin stems: Pride, Covetousness, Lust, Anger, Gluttony, Envy, Sloth.

PART IV – How to Go to Confession

- 1. After the priest greets you in the name of Christ, make the sign of the cross. He may choose to recite a reading from Scripture, after which you say: "Bless me Father for I have sinned. It has been **(state how long) since my last confession. These are my sins."**
- 2. Tell your sins simply and honestly to the priest. You might even want to discuss the circumstances and the root causes of your sins and ask the priest for advice or direction.
- 3. Listen to the advice the priest gives you and accept the penance from him. Then make and Act of Contrition for your sins.

My God, I am sorry for my sins with all my heart. In choosing to do wrong and failing to do good, I have sinned against you whom I should love above all things. I firmly intend, with your help, to do penance, to sin no more, and to avoid whatever leads me to sin. Our Savior Jesus Christ suffered and died for us. In His name, my God, have mercy.

Amen

- 4. The priest will then dismiss you with the words of praise: "Give thanks to the Lord for He is good." You respond: "For His mercy endures forever." The priest will then conclude with: "The Lord has freed you from your sins. Go in peace." And you respond by saying: "Thanks be to God."
- 5. Spend some time with Our Lord thanking and praising Him for the gift of His mercy. Try to perform your penance as soon as possible.

Stations of the Cross Way of the Cross

Introduction

Leader:

Let us pray,

Holy Father, look kindly on us as we prepare to retrace, step by step, the luminous path of the cross, alongside Jesus our Redeemer. We ask this through Christ our Lord.

Or

Father, look kindly on us as we prepare to contemplate, at Jesus' side, the mysteries of his passion. Instruct us in the school of redemptive suffering, so that we will recognize and take up our own cross, embracing it with love. We ask this through Christ our Lord.

Station 1: Jesus is Condemned to Death

Leader: The first station: Jesus is condemned to death. We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you.

All: Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

Reader 1: "Hearing these words, Pilate led Jesus out and seated himself on the chair of judgment at a place called the Pavement, in Hebrew, Gabbatha. It was Passover Preparation day, about the sixth hour. 'Here is your King,' said Pilate to the Jews. 'Take him away!' they said. 'Crucify him!' 'Do you want me to crucify your King?' said Pilate. The chief priest answered, 'We have no king except Caesar'" (John 19: 13 – 15).

Reader 2: "What will separate us from the love of Christ? Will anguish, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or the sword? As it is written: 'For your sake we are being slain all the day; we are looked upon as sheep to be slaughtered.' No, in all these things we conquer overwhelmingly through him who loved us (Romans 8: 35 – 37).

Leader: Father most holy, grant that the sacrifice of Jesus Christ your Son will yield a hundred – fold in us so that from his fullness we will all receive grace upon grace. We ask this through the same Jesus Christ our Lord. **All:** Amen

(Pray the Our Father during the walk to the next station.)

Station 2: Jesus Takes Up His Cross

Leader: The second station: Jesus takes up his cross. We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you.

All: Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

Reader 1: "The soldiers led him away inside the palace, that is the praetorium, and assembled the whole cohort. They clothed him in purple, and weaving a crown of thorns, placed it on him. they began to salute him with, 'Hail, King of the Jews!' and kept striking his head with a reed and spitting on him. they knelt before him in homage. And when they had mocked him, they stripped him of the purple cloak, dressed him in his own clothes, and led him out to crucify him" (Mark 15: 16 –21).

Reader 2: "Have among yourselves the same attitude that is also yours in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God something to be grasped. Rather, he emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, coming in human likeness; and, found human in appearance, he humbled himself, becoming obedient to death, even death on a Cross" (Philippians 2: 5 –8).

Leader: We ask you, Lord, to help us carry our personal and intransferable cross enthusiastically and constantly, for you have given us this gift so that we can unite ourselves to your Son on his way to Calvary, Through the same Christ our Lord. **All:** Amen

Spiritual Exercises Retreat

Station 3: Jesus Falls the First Time

Leader: The third station: Jesus falls the first time. We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you.

All: Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

Reader 1: "No slave is greater than his master.' If they persecuted me they will persecute you. If they kept my word, they will also keep yours. And they will do all these things to you on account of my name" (John 15: 20-21).

Reader 2: "Rather, God has chose the foolish of the world to shame the wise, and God chose the weak of the world to shame the strong, and God has chose the lowly and despised of the world, those who count for nothing, to reduce to nothing those who are something, so that no human being might boast before God" (I Corinthians 1: 27 – 29).

Leader: Lord God, never permit us to yearn for a life without crosses, but a life of crosses with Christ; for the cross is a given, inherent to human life, especially for those who have agreed to follow him along the path to Calvary. We ask this through Christ our Lord.

All: Amen

Station 4: Jesus Meets His Mother

Leader: The fourth station: Jesus meets his mother. We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you.

All: Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

Reader 1: "Three days later they found him in the Temple, sitting among the teachers. They were overcome when they saw him, and his mother said to him, 'My child, why have you done this to us? See how worried your father and I have been, looking for you.' He replied, 'Why were you looking for me? Did you not know that I must be busy with my Father's affairs?"" (Luke 2: 48 – 49).

Reader 2: "But when the fullness of time had come, God sent his Son, born of a woman, born under the law, to ransom those under the law, so that we might receive adoption" (Galatians 4: 4 – 5).

Leader: We thank you, Lord, for the clear example of faith Mary gives us. We pray that by reflecting and suffering with her we will grow in our understanding of Christ's mysteries, and our faith will be our strength and sure hope until life's end. We ask this through Christ our Lord.

Station 5: Simon of Cyrene Helps Jesus to Carry the Cross

Leader: The fifth station: Simon of Cyrene helps Jesus to carry the cross. We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you.

All: Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

Reader 1: "They led him out to crucify him. They enlisted a passerby, Simon of Cyrene, father of Alexander and Rufus, who was coming in from the country, to carry his CrOSS" (Mark 15: 21 – 22).

Reader 2: "Bear one another's burdens, and so you will fulfill the law of Christ. For if anyone thinks he is something when he is nothing, he is deluding himself. But may I never boast except in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, through which the world has been crucified to me, and I to the world" (Galatians 6: 2 – 3, 14).

Leader: Lord Jesus, give us the grace to be enthusiastic and steadfast in carrying the cross that in your kindness you have given us, so our love for those souls that are far from you will drive us to walk by your side on the way to Calvary. You live and reign for ever and ever.

All: Amen

Station 6: Veronica Wipes the Face of Jesus

Leader: The sixth station: Veronica wipes the face of Jesus. We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you.

All: Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

Reader 1: "Come, you who are blessed by my Father. Inherit the Kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world. For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, a stranger and you welcomed me, naked and you clothed me, in prison and you visited me" (Matthew 25: 34 – 36).

Reader 2: Let us not grow tired of doing good, for in due time we shall reap our harvest, if we do not give up. So then, while we have the opportunity, let us do good to all, but especially to those who belong to the family of the faith" (Galatians 6: 9 - 10).

Leader: Moved by the example of Veronica, who honored Christ and offered him the sincere homage of her love and gratitude, we ask you, almighty God, for the strength to be men and women of the Kingdom who will not shrink from the prospect of suffering and the cross. We ask this through Christ our Lord.

Station 7: Jesus Falls a Second Time

Leader: The seventh station: Jesus falls a second time. We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you.

All: Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

Reader 1: "Blessed are they who mourn, for they will be comforted. Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the land. Blessed are they who are persecuted for the sake of righteousness, for theirs is the Kingdom of heaven" (Matthew 5: 4, 5, 10).

Reader 2: "I am content with weaknesses, insults, hardships, persecutions, and constraints, for the sake of Christ; for when I am weak, then I am strong" (II Corinthians 12:10).

Leader: Lord Jesus, we know that you deserve everything from us and that anything we offer you will always be pitifully small. Look with favor on our efforts to spend our lives for you selflessly and without limit, and be the guarantee of our final victory, you who live and reign for ever and ever.

All: Amen.

Station 8: Jesus Meets the Women of Jerusalem

Leader: The eighth station: Jesus meets the women of Jerusalem. We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you.

All: Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

Reader 1: "Anyone who welcomes you welcomes me; and those who welcome me welcome the one who sent me. If anyone gives so much as a cup of cold water to one of these little ones because he is a disciple, amen, I say to you, he will most certainly not lose his reward" (Matthew 10: 40, 42).

Reader 2: "Behold, now is a very acceptable time; behold, now is the day of salvation. In everything we commend ourselves as ministers of God, as sorrowful yet always rejoicing; as poor yet enriching many; as having nothing yet possessing all things" (II Corinthians 6: 2, 4, 10).

Leader: Loving Father, enlighten our minds and hearts to understand all that Christ wants to be for us. Enable us to enjoy the pardon and peace he won for us by generously giving himself. We ask this through Christ our Lord.

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Station 9: Jesus Falls the Third Time

Leader: The ninth station: Jesus falls the third time. We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you.

All: Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

Reader 1: "Watch and pray that you may not undergo the test. The spirit is willing, but the flesh is weak. Withdrawing a second time, he prayed again, 'My Father, if it is not possible that this cup pass without my drinking it, your will be done!" (Matthew 26: 41 – 42).

Reader 2: "Because Christ himself was tested through what he suffered, he is able to help those who are being tested. So let us confidently approach the throne of grace to receive mercy and find grace for timely help" (Hebrews 2: 18; 4:16).

Leader: Holy Father, enable us to understand that it matters not if we fall a thousand times, as long as we love the fight and not the fall. Grant us the strength to battle on, knowing for sure that this is more pleasing to Christ than an easy victory achieved at no cost. We ask this through Christ our Lord.

All: Amen.

Station 10: Jesus is Stripped of His Garments

Leader: The tenth station: Jesus is stripped of his garments. We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you.

All: Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

Reader 1: "And when they came to a place called Golgotha (which means Place of the Skull), they gave Jesus wine to drink mixed with gall. But when he tasted it, he refused to drink. After they had crucified him, they divided his garments by casting lots; then they sat down and kept watch over him there" (Matthew 27: 33 – 36).

Reader 2: "Whatever gains I had, these I have come to consider a loss because of Christ. More than that, I even consider everything as a loss because of the supreme good of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have accepted the loss of all things, and I consider them so much rubbish, that I may gain Christ" (Philippians 3: 7 - 8).

Leader: Lord our God, place in the depths of our hearts the firm conviction that as life advances and eternity draws near, only Christ's love remains. Make this love be the treasure for which we sell everything, until we experience the satisfaction and joy of being seeds fallen in the furrow beside him. We ask this through Christ our Lord.

Station 11: Jesus is Nailed to the Cross

Leader: The eleventh station: Jesus is nailed to the Cross. We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you.

All: Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

Reader 1: "They crucified him, and with him two others, one on either side, with Jesus in the middle. Pilate also had an inscription written and put on the cross. It read, 'Jesus the Nazorean, King of the Jews.' Now many of the Jews read this inscription, because the place where Jesus was crucified was near the city; and it was written in Hebrew, Latin and Greek" (John 19: 18 – 20).

Reader 2: "For through the law I died to the law, that I might live for God. I have been crucified with Christ; yet I live, no longer I, but Christ lives in me; insofar as I now live in the flesh, I live by faith in the Son of God who has loved me and given himself up for me" (Galatians 2: 19 – 20).

Leader: Loving Father, in Christ's cross you show us the living reality of your personal love for man. Enlighten our consciences so that we will accept that the most fruitful and beautiful life is spent following Jesus Christ to the cross in order to accomplish your will. We ask this through Christ our Lord.

All: Amen.

Station 12: Jesus Dies on the Cross

Leader: The twelfth station: Jesus dies on the Cross. We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you.

All: Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

Reader 1: "Now one of the criminals hanging there reviled Jesus, saying, 'Are you not the Messiah? Save yourself and us.' The other, however, rebuking him, said in reply, 'Have you no fear of God, for you are subject to the same condemnation? And indeed, we have been condemned justly, for the sentence we received corresponds to our crimes, but this man has done nothing criminal.' Then he said, 'Jesus, remember me when you come into your Kingdom.' He replied to him, 'Amen, I say to you, today you will be with me in Paradise'... Jesus cried out in a loud voice, 'Father, into your hands I commend my spirit'; and when he had said this he breathed his last" (Luke 23: 39 - 43, 46).

Reader 2: "If God is for us, who can be against us? He who did not spare his own Son but handed him over for us all, how will he not also give us everything else along with him? Christ Jesus, who died for us, indeed intercedes for us" (Romans 8:31–32, 34).

Leader: Holy Father, we are moved by the sight of your crucified Son cursed by his enemies, denied by his own and suffering in silence for the love of us; we ask you for the courage to carry our cross with the optimism of a Christian who knows by faith the importance of his life in relation to eternity. Enable us to be Good Samaritans, helping others to carry their cross as well. We ask this through Christ our Lord.

Station 13: Jesus is Taken Down From the Cross

Leader: The thirteenth station: Jesus is taken down from the Cross. We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you.

All: Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

Reader 1: "But one of the soldiers thrust his lance into his side, and immediately blood and water flowed out. An eyewitness has testified, and his testimony is true; he knows that he is speaking the truth, so that you also come to believe. For this happened so that the scripture passage might be fulfilled: 'Not a bone of it will be broken.' And again another passage says: 'They will look on him whom they have pierced.' After this, Joseph of Arimathea, secretly a disciple of Jesus for fear of the Jews, asked Pilate if he could remove the body of Jesus. And Pilate permitted it. So he came and took his body" (John 19: 34 – 38).

Reader 2: "Jews demand signs and Greeks look for wisdom, but we proclaim Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles; for the foolishness of God is wiser than human wisdom, and the weakness of God is stronger than human strength" (1 Corinthians 1: 22 – 23, 25).

Leader: Lord, may our sufferings not drive us away from you but instead make us better understand what your Son, Jesus Christ, suffered during his passion, and draw us closer to him. We ask this through Christ our Lord.

All: Amen.

Station 14: Jesus is Laid in the Tomb

Leader: The fourteenth station: Jesus is laid in the tomb. We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you.

All: Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

Reader 1: "After Joseph of Arimathea had taken the body [of Jesus] down, he wrapped it in a linen cloth and laid him in a rock-hewn tomb in which no one had yet been buried. Then he rolled a stone against the entrance to the tomb. Mary Magdalene and Mary the mother of Jesus watched where he was laid" (Luke 23: 53 – 54; Mark 15: 46 – 47).

Reader 2: "The time of my departure is at hand. I have competed well; I have finished the race; I have kept the faith. From now on the crown of righteousness awaits me, which the Lord, the just judge, will award me" (Timothy 4:6-8).

Leader: Father, help us to meditate on the mystery of the cross and delve into its depths, since therein lie our trust and our greatness. Grant that by dying and being buried with Christ, our poor, weak mortal life will be transfigured and raised with him, who lives and reigns with you for ever and ever.

Stations of the Cross Way of the Cross

Conclusion:

Leader:

Let us pray,

Lord, let your blessing descend abundantly on this family of yours which has commemorated the death of your Son in the hope of his holy resurrection. Let your pardon come upon us, grant us your consolation, increase our faith, and secure for us eternal redemption. We ask this through Christ our Lord.

All: Amen.

Or

Holy Father, step by step we have retraced the way of the cross. Grant us the grace of engraving on our minds and in our hearts the image of your Son crucified in the supreme act of love with which he shattered the bitterness and senselessness of suffering and turned it into joy and an indispensable means to salvation and holiness. May we respond with constant love to the constant presence of suffering in our lives, and match the depth of our suffering with intensity of our self – giving. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Program of Life Worksheet Explained

Step 1: Determine My Root Sin

(Completing this exercise will assist you to "unlock" your root sin. This exercise correlates with the Program of Life Worksheet)

- 1a. Make a list of the things that you repeatedly need to confess, or the things that you say and/or do over and over again that you know are wrong and hurtful, and that separate you from God. List these on the worksheet as Words/Actions
- 1b. For each word/action answer the following three questions:
 - Why do I do it?
 - Why is what I am doing a little twisted?
 - What is the ROOT CAUSE behind my words/action?

There are 3 root causes (root sins) that usually all other sins originate.

- **PRIDE** disordered attachment to self.
- **VANITY** disordered attachment to what other's think.
- **SENSUALITY** disordered attachment to comfort, ease and pleasure (laziness)

Examples:

- Word/action critical of my husband and can be bossy
- Why do I do it? I don't like the way he does things.
- Why is it twisted? I am assuming my way is better than his way.
- Root Cause Pride

We have all three but one is typically more dominate. Choosing <u>ONE</u> root sin will help better aim our efforts to grow spiritually. It is like gardening, if you want to remove weeds, you can't just pull the stem; you have to get to the root. See Fr. John Bartunek's Q&A describing Root Sin.

- 1d. Write a paragraph describing your root sin in your own words and how it manifests itself within me. The way root sin manifest itself is different for each person. This exercise will help make your root sin personal. These manifestations of your root sin are necessary for Step 2.
- 1e. List your manifestations.

Step 2: Determine My Opposite Virtues

- 2a. Write a paragraph describing the opposite behavior of what you described as the manifestations of your root sin.
- 2b. Now ask yourself, which virtue comes close to the opposite behavior you just described
 - This is your opposite virtue that should become the central focus of all your spiritual effort
 - This is the virtue that will help you grow closer to Christ, heal your heart, intellect, and your will and <u>slowly</u> free you from your sin.
 - This is the virtue that will help you become the women God created you to be. Living more in his image and likeness.

Root Sin versus Virtue

PRIDE – humility, generosity, charity, meekness, simplicity, compassion **VANITY** – purity of intention, love for Christ, purity, seeing Christ in others

SENSUALITY – discipline for love of Christ, focus on the person of Christ, self-denial out of love for Christ, hope, spirit of sacrifice, purity Example

- Root Sin Pride
- Opposite Virtue Humility

 - Be specific and practical so you don't get discouraged
- Keep it simple
- Make it personal and specific with names etc. (not generic)
- Be positive: I will be vs. I won't be.
- Challenge yourself but be realistic... crawl, walk, run
- Make your means achievable and measurable (yes/no)
- Most important keep is Christ centered, all for the love of Christ
- Focus on your relationship with God, your spouse, your children and then others

Step 3: Determine My Ideal

Define the ideal you are striving to imitate. Capture an image of Jesus that captures your heart; when you see this image, you want to imitate it. Or an aspect of Jesus' personality that inspires you to be more likes Christ.

Example

- Image Jesus washing of the feet of the apostles
- Personality trait Jesus attentive to the needs of others

Step 4: Determine My Motto

Use a phrase or a quote from scripture that speaks to you and motivates you to live your virtue.

Example

Jesus came to serve, not to be served

Step 5: My Program of Life

Once you complete the worksheet, it is time to package everything into a nice one-sheet program that is easily assessable.

Use your Program of Life! It is your best tool to help review the direction of your day. Review it before going to confession. Review and discuss with your spiritual director each visit. Your Program of Life will help you grow spiritually, to grow closer to God.

PRAY! PRAY! PRAY!

You CANNOT develop your Program of Life alone. Listen to the inspirations from the Holy Spirit as he reveals all of this to you.

Root Sin

There are three predominant faults/root sins.

COMMON MANIFESTATIONS OF PRIDE:

- too high an opinion of myself
- annoyance with those who contradict me, brooking no contradictions
- anger if I don't get my way or am not taken into account
- easily judgmental, putting others down, gossiping about them
- slow to recognize my own mistakes, or to see when I hurt others, and inability to seek and give forgiveness
- rage when others don't thank me for favors
- unwillingness to serve, rebellion against what I don't like
- impatience, distance, brusqueness in my daily contact with others
- thinking I am the only one who knows how to do things right, unwillingness to let others help
- inflated idea of my own intelligence and understanding, dismissing what
 I do not understand or what others see differently
- not feeling a need for God, even though I do say prayers
- nursing grudges, even in small matters
- never taking orders
- inflexible in preferences
- always putting myself and my things first, indifference towards others and their needs, never putting myself out for them
- centering everything (conversation, choices..) on myself and my likes
- calculating in my relations with God and with others

COMMON MANIFESTATIONS OF VANITY:

- always seeking admiration and praise, worrying about not getting it
- excessive concern about physical appearance
- being guided by the opinions of others rather than principle (this is sometimes called "human respect")
- some types of shyness
- sacrificing principles in order to fit in
- placing too much a premium on popularity and acceptance
- easily discouraged at my failures
- taking pleasure in listening to gossip and hearing about others' failures
- always wanting to be the center of attention, at times stretching the truth, or lying outright, or being uncharitable in my words in order to achieve this

COMMON MANIFESTATIONS OF SENSUALITY

- laziness
- always the most comfortable, what requires least effort
- not going the extra mile for others
- procrastination, last-minute in everything
- shoddiness, complaining, excessively affected by minor discomforts
- inability to sacrifice
- not doing my part at home
- expecting everyone else to serve me always
- behavior and decisions ruled by my feelings and moods instead of my principles
- daydreaming a lot with self at center
- unable to control my thoughts when they attract me, even if they are not good
- doing only what I enjoy (choice of food, work, etc)
- uncontrolled and overpowering curiosity, wanting to see and experience everything and every pleasure
- my senses and impulses overrule what I know is right and wrong
- acting out my feelings (frustrations, desires...) with no regard for my conscience, God or others
- only working with those I like, being easily hurt

- 8. In practice, what does my love of Christ oblige me to: to not offend Him? to fulfill his will in my life? to want to do great things with my life for his Kingdom? to prepare myself as best I can to win over many souls?
- 9. Is Christ truly in the first place on my scale of values or are there other things, for all practical purposes, that I put before Him?
- 10. Do I think of Christ throughout the day? In difficult moments do I forget about Him? In moments of joy and triumph do I leave Him out?

- 11. Do I think like Jesus Christ with regard to fame? To my friendships? My comforts? The esteem of others? Humiliations? Of sickness and suffering?
- 12. Is my way of thinking and judging really based on faith, or on purely human criteria? Am I a rationalist, one who leaves faith and the criteria of Christ out of the picture when making decisions?

SUNDAY

OUR CALL TO SANCTITY

- 1. Do I feel called by God to be a saint? Do I feel that my principal obligation as spouse and parent is to not only to sanctify myself but help sanctify the whole family as well?
- 2. Have I put any limits on what Christ is asking of me? Am I holding back on anything or have I already surrendered him EVERY aspect of my life?
- 3. Have I arrived to the point where calling myself a Christian really has lost all meaning? Does being Catholic mean more than going to Mass on Sunday? Does it effect EVERY aspect of my life?
- 4. Do I have a conscience that is clear and totally at peace with itself? Am I delicate to avoid any sin or even imperfection that would be an obstacle to my sanctity? Do I recognize my obligation as a Catholic of forming my conscience according to the teaching of the Church?
- 5. What is my attitude toward the sacrament of reconciliation? Is it like a drive-in restaurant where I read off the list of my sins and then go to the next window to pick up the absolution? Is it only a last resort, something for extreme circumstances or something to fulfill my Easter obligation? Is it where I best experience the love of God and receive the strength I need to grow in love towards Christ?
- 6. What is my main obstacle toward sanctity? Pride? Vanity? ? Criticizing others? Speaking badly of others? Thinking badly of others? Resentment? Lack of love and attention toward my family? Gossip? Laziness? Disorderly attachment to material goods? Worry to what others think of me? Selfishness? Egoism? Activism, not giving time to Christ? Negligence and omission, not helping others in the measure of my own possibility?

- 7. Have I made a proposal to solve the dilemma of deciding to whom my heart belongs; Christ or my egoism, my family through Christ or my selfishness, Christ serving others or myself being served by all? Have I come to the conclusion that there can be no sanctity without the radical denial of my own egoism and selfishness?
- 8. Do I have an intimate relationship with the PERSON of Jesus Christ? As this relationship grows, do I assimilate the same thoughts, the same sentiments, longings, loves, criteria as the person of Christ?
- 9. What does this relationship entail? Is it based on true love and selfgiving? Does it permeate EVERY aspect of my life or do I still reserve some area purely for myself?
- 10. Have I found a treasure in Christ so big that I have to give it to others through some type of apostolate whether in my parish or with some other group? Do I make excuses saying that I have no talents or I have no time? (No time to give Christ?)
- 11. Is my first apostolate with my spouse and children? Have I given them the faith in all its fullness? Have I developed in them a real spiritual life, teaching them how to have a real relationship with the person of Christ?

The Five Steps of the Lectio Divina

- **Lectio (Read)**: The first step is reverential listening; listening both in a spirit of silence and of awe. You are listening for the voice of God speaking to you intimately. In lectio, read slowly and attentively, listening for a word or phrase that is God's Word for you.
- **Meditatio** (**Meditate**): Once you have heard your word or phrase that is speaking to you in a personal way, take it in and ponder it. Memorize it and while gently repeating it to yourself, allow it to interact with your thoughts, your memories, your hopes, your desires. This is the second step or stage. In this step, allow God's Word to become His Word for you, a word that touches you and affects you at your deepest levels.
- **Oratio (Prayer)**: The third step is the prayer step...prayer understood both as dialogue with God and as consecration, or prayer as an offering to God of parts of ourselves that we have not previously believed God wants. Allow the word that we have taken in and on which we are meditating to touch and change your deepest self. Just as a priest consecrates the bread and wine at the Eucharist, God invites us to hold up our most difficult and pain-filled experiences to Him, and to gently recite over them the healing word or phrase He has given us in our lectio and meditatio. Finally, allow yourself to be touched and changed by the Word of God.
- **Contemplatio** (**Contemplate**): In the final step, simply rest in the presence of God and accept His transforming embrace. No one who has ever been in love needs to be reminded that there are moments in loving relationships when words are not even necessary. It is the same in our relationship with God. Contemplation during the Lectio Divina is a wordless, quiet rest in the presence of God. In silence, let go of your own words and simply enjoy the experience of being in the presence of God.
- Actio (Action): Take some action
